Prelude:

Welcome & Introduction

Today we come together to worship and continue to explore what it means to encounter, embrace and embody Christ in the world. To me, this has always felt like a natural progression:

- Before we can embody Christ, we have to have Christ revealed to us—whether that is growing up in a Christian environment, reading/hearing the Word, feeling that ah-ha moment of a higher power in creation or art, experiencing love from another person, laughing out loud.
 - Sometimes it's just the super simple stuff and the moments of mindfulness. Yesterday when I watched water go down the drain, such a simple everyday thing and yet, I was struck by wonder that is water. How often do we stop to think about water? What is it and what it does? How often do we stop and feel gratitude for the water we have? How often do we stop and recognise the goodness of water, and by extension, the goodness of God?
- Once our curiosity has been sparked and we begin on a journey of seeking this
 Christ, we, perhaps even unconsciously, begin to value the things that Christ values,
 we begin to embrace Kingdom ways, seeking peace and love, true wisdom, order out
 of chaos, purpose, etc. This shapes our identity, the person we are at our core. You
 may choose to think of it as embracing who we were created to be.
- What we truly believe determines what we think, how we process, how we see others, how we speak and act. This is embodying Christ. This is what 2 Corinthians 5 means when we read that we are called to be ambassadors. Jesus often said, "when you see Me, you have seen the Father". It is our hope that we can say, with humility and grace for when we fall short, "when you see me, you have seen Jesus".

To me, it has always been a problem to try to jump straight to the "embody" part of the equation. It only leads to feelings of guilt instead of joy, a doing of works out of duty instead of zeal. This is not a process to be rushed but pursued daily --as we attempt to understand God's deep love for us and to respond honestly.

Our service today is an interactive offering of readings, prayers, songs and storytelling arranged in 3 sections: encounter, embrace & embody. Thank you to all our participants this morning. I encourage us to take our time processing what we hear and say, making ourselves open to the voice of God this morning.

Children's time-talk about seeing God in everything

Scripture: (Reader #1)

God is in all and through all, and if we open ourselves, we will see God.

We read in Ephesians 4:4-6 For there is one body and one Spirit, just as you have been called to one glorious hope for the future. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of all, who is over all, in all, and living through all.

And Psalm 139:7-10 says: I can never escape from your Spirit! I can never get away from your presence! If I go up to heaven, you are there; if I go down to the grave, you are there. If I ride the wings of the morning, if I dwell by the farthest oceans, even there your hand will guide me, and your strength will support me.

Here are just some of my thoughts I had about how and where we encounter God in big and small ways (see bulletin insert/handout):

- Creation
- Scripture
- Prayer and Meditation
- The arts-music, artwork, architecture, etc.
- Community, Family, Parenting, Relationships
- New ideas

How do these encounters and experiences translate into a "knowing" and a "becoming"? You may have gone for a walk in the mountains or in the early morning. And you may have taken a deep breath and experienced a connectedness or a sense of well-being. This peace may have steered you toward some sort of epiphany or "knowing". Maybe you thought: I feel good, nature is good, I am part of this morning, part of my surroundings, I am part of an interchange and an interdependence on what is around me. Maybe you thought: this world is amazing, there is an order to it, not an accident, maybe there is a Creator. If so, this Creator must be good, this Creator creates good things, this Creator must love the results of their labor. I am part of that, the Creator must love me too. And then: I am beloved, I am of value. And then, I can create love and goodness too. This could all happen in an instant, and yet you've engaged in different ways of knowing that have begun to alter your self-identity.

I've heard of 8 different kinds of knowing:

- Language
- Sense perception
- Emotion
- Reason
- Imagination
- Faith
- Intuition
- Memory

Each of these ways of knowledge have validity and power, although they are not simple, and often require thoughtfulness and evaluation as well. But it serves us well to realize that we are complex beings with more than one way of understanding things. It is important for us to open ourselves us to new ways and important to extend grace and humility when hearing other people's experiences.

Storytelling: Storyteller #1--short sharing (5minutes or less) about encountering Christ in the world

Example: For myself, almost 3 years ago, when I was part of MCA's visioning process, as many of us were, we had communion as a body of believers. Betty Pries led us in a communion service where we sang these words over and over again: "We become what we receive." Although it felt a little out of my comfort zone, I engaged in what she asked, closed my eyes and repeated that refrain again and again. As I did so, I had a vision of Jesus standing at the front of the sanctuary extending his hand. I say vision, but what does that mean? Was it my imagination? Was it just what I thought those words meant? But I realized of how much Jesus loved me, loves all of us, extending his hand in invitation, love and blessing. And I saw myself accepting that hand.

Now, any psychologist would tell you that in order to extend kindness and grace to others, kindness and grace must have been extended to you; to show perseverance or strength in adversity, that also would have had to been modelled for you; and to give love, you must have experienced love. So, in that image of accepting the invitation of grace and love from Jesus, I saw myself standing next to Jesus and extending my hand as well.

I wrote that experience down because I didn't want to forget it. I have long since forgotten where I put that paper, but that understanding, that knowing that I received in that moment has not be forgotten.

So it is when I hear the words about being an ambassador for Christ, that I know it has nothing to do with me and my ego, but only of the love of Jesus and the identity I have in Him, and the power of the Spirit flowing from God to others through me as a conduit. I am far from perfect, who is? But we can allow ourselves to know, understand and be changed, rearranged, willing to be ambassadors, trusting God will work God-mysteries through us, and that some small God-light will shine through our words and actions. We can attempt to make small choices daily in how we react to the words and actions of others; we can determine to keep growing and extending grace to ourselves and others; we can choose how we allot our finances, how we spend our spare time; and we can work on practising the pause more often.

Embrace

How do we re-form our identity in Christ?

Betty Pries, at the conclusion of MC AB's visioning process, shared a visual image with us. Picture an outline of a person, but more like a gingerbread man outline, and at the center where we might draw a heart, she drew a little house.

At the core of who we are, where God made us in God's image—that is what she called the Godhouse, the God-spark, and what we might call our true identity. Many of us, most of us if we're being honest, live and find our identity closer to the skin: what we look like, what we accomplish, how much money we make, how many friends we have, how smart we are, how athletic, etc. But Betty explained that the closer we move our identity to the God-house, the more peace and joy we find; the more we seek to find our identity in Christ, the more we are our true, God-created selves.

We draw closer to the God-house when we engage in spiritual disciples and when we choose to encounter Christ deliberately in daily situations, re-aligning and re-orienting ourselves, there-by creating brain pathways that turn to God first in any situation.

This is the "embracing" that needs to happen before we can "embody" Christ.

P: Anyone who is in Christ is a new creation.

The old life has gone; a new life has begun.

L: Know that you are forgiven, and be at peace.

P: Amen.

Scripture: (Reader #2)

If we ever wonder what it is we are called to embrace and to love, we can turn to Galatians 5:22-25 which says:

But the Holy Spirit produces this kind of fruit in our lives: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against these things!

Those who belong to Christ Jesus have nailed the passions and desires of their sinful nature to his cross and crucified them there. Since we are living by the Spirit, let us follow the Spirit's leading in every part of our lives.
